Mapping the Field(s): New Intersections in Spatial Humanities

- The 'spatial turn' in the humanities involves engaging textual and visual geographies. Combining cartographic and landscape analyses, this lecture will use 'mapping' as a means to explore new intersections between spatial humanities disciplines. Through drawing on recent cross-disciplinary research projects on historic maps and map-making, and by focusing especially on the application of digital tools and geospatial methodologies to 'open up the map', the importance of 'the field' is considered as a locale that connects mapping both past and present.

Professor Keith Lilley is a historical geographer with particular research expertise in interpreting historic landscapes, maps, and built environments.

His current projects include combining GIS and prosopography in analysing historic maps of Britain and Ireland, and tracing global histories of field-surveying and geodetics through landscapes and maps.

In 2018 Prof. Lilley received the *Cuthbert Peek Award* from the Royal Geographical Society (RGS) "For advancing geographical knowledge through the application of contemporary methods, including GIS and mapping." General Editor of the British Historic Towns Atlas and Chair of the Historic Towns Trust, Prof. Lilley is based at Queen's University Belfast, in the School of Natural and Built Environment.
